

War

- **Underlying Causes**: ongoing issues
- **Immediate Cause**: specific events - Spark

Causes of Spanish-American War

- **Cuban Revolution**
 - Americans sympathized with rebels – seen as similar struggle to American Revolution
- **Yellow Journalism**
 - Sensational, biased, and often fake reporting
 - “You Furnish the pictures and I’ll furnish the war.” – William Randolph Hearst
 - Reports on Spanish atrocities
- **U.S. Business interests in Cuba** – sugar plantations – concerned about instability
- **IMMEDIATE CAUSE** - Explosion of the Maine
 - 260 Officers killed
 - “Remember the Maine”










