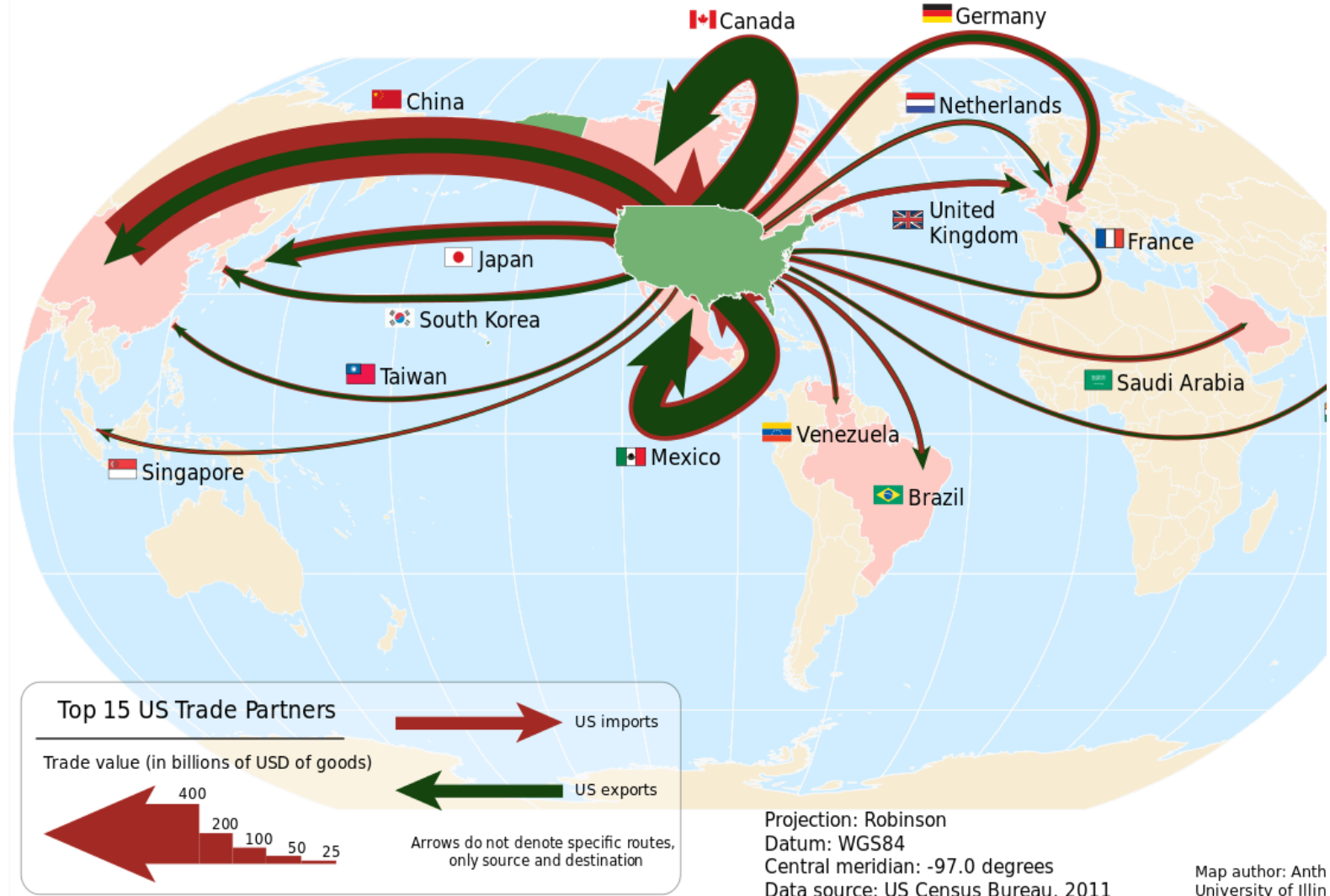


Aim: How and why did the United States try to open trade relations with Asia during the second half of the 19th century?

U.S. Trade with Asia(Late 19th Century)

- Why would the United States have sought to open up trade in Asia during the mid or late 19th century?

- Industrial Revolution
 - U.S. wanted raw materials and markets

Isolationism

- A policy of avoiding political and economic entanglements with other countries.

- Why would it have been difficult for the U.S. to open up trade with Japan? - read the edict of 1634 – Why did Japan become isolated in 1634?

Japan's Meiji Restoration (1868)

- Selective borrowing from the West
- Industrialized
- Modernized military
- Pursued an Imperialistic Policy

- Sino-Japanese War (1894-1895) – Japan acquired Taiwan and a sphere of influence in Korea
- Russo-Japanese War – (1904-1905) – over Korea & Manchuria

Sphere of Influence

- Economic control over a foreign territory

Open Door Policy – (1899) Late 19th and early 20th centuries

- U.S. asked European countries with “spheres of influence” in China to allow all countries to trade with China.
