Griswold v. Connecticut (1965)

<u>Issue</u>: Did the Connecticut law violate a married couples right to privacy?

<u>Decision</u>: Ruled in favor of Griswold. The marital relationship was a zone of privacy protected by the Constitution.

Effect: a constitutional right to privacy was established for the first time.

Roe v. Wade (1973)

 Issue: Does the Constitution recognize a woman's right to terminate her pregnancy by abortion?

- Decision: Supreme Court ruled in favor of Roe. The Court extended the definition of privacy as established in Griswold v. Connecticut. A woman has a right to privacy to choose what to do with her body.
 - 1st Trimester: No restrictions/can't prohibit
 - 2nd Trimester: May restrict/can't prohibit
 - 3rd Trimester: May prohibit

Planned Parenthood v. Casey (1992)

Decision:

- Undue Burden Test Does the state regulation have the effect of placing a substantial obstacle in the path of a woman seeking an abortion of a nonviable fetus?
- The trimester approach established by Justice Blackmun in Roe was exchanged for a viability approach
