Turning Points of World War II

- June 1941 Nazi invasion of the Soviet Union.
- Battle of Stalingrad (1942)
- December 7, 1941 Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor (Hawaii) –>U.S. Entry.
- Battle of Midway First Japanese defeat
- June 6, 1944 Invasion of France at Normandy: D-DAY
 - Operation Fortitude

FALL OF THE AXIS POWERS

- July 1943 Invasion of Italy (Britain & France) – Mussolini overthrown
- Battle of the Bulge (Dec. 1944-Jan. 1945) – Allies defeat Germans in Belgium and invade Germany.
- April 30th, 1945 Hitler commits suicide
- May 7, 1945 Germany accepts unconditional surrender
- May 8, 1945 V-E Day "Victory in Europe" Day

April 12, 1945

- FDR Died
- Harry Truman became President

MANHATTAN PROJECT

• U.S. project to develop an atomic bomb. ENOLA GAY

• B-29 Bomber that dropped the Atomic Bomb on Hiroshima 8/6 & Nagasaki 8/8

• September 2, 1945 – Japan signs unconditional surrender.

Atomic Bomb

- Japanese refusal of Unconditional Surrender
- Threaten Stalin
- Invasion of Japanese islands would cost American lives.

TEHRAN CONFERENCE (1943):

- "Big Three"
 - Roosevelt (FDR) U.S.
 - Churchill -
 - Stalin Soviet Union
- Confirmed the launching of the cross- English Channel Normandy Invasion
- Stalin promised the Soviet Union would Declare war on Japan once Germany was defeated

YALTA CONFERENCE (Feb 1945)

- "Big Three"
- Stalin guaranteed that the Soviet Union would declare war on Japan within six months.
